KEYNOTE BIOGRAPHIES

Tina Owen, Principal, Alliance School

Tina Owen, lead teacher and founder of The Alliance School, earned her teaching degree from Marquette University in May of 1998, graduating with high honors in English and Secondary Education, and she recently completed her degree in Administrative Leadership at Alverno College. She taught for seven years at Washington High School in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, where she served in a variety of leadership roles, both as a faculty member and as a student advisor. As a teacher at Washington, Tina saw that many young people were facing harassment at school. Inspired by the Harvey Milk High School in New York, she started The Alliance School, a school dedicated to providing a safe learning environment for youth who are bullied. Steeped in best practices in education and founded on Abraham Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs, The Alliance School seeks to ensure that students' physical and emotional needs are met so that learning is possible.

Owen has been recognized in the print media, including in *Time Magazine*, *The Advocate*, and *Milwaukee Magazine* and was also a guest on the "Good Morning America" show. In 2008, she won the Innovator of the Year Award for her collaborative effort to start the Teacher-Led Network, an advocacy network for teacher-led schools, and in November of 2009, The Alliance School was awarded the Wisconsin Charter School of the Year Silver Award for High Achievement, a statewide honor and a testament to her work and the work of the Alliance school staff.

Dr. Sue Stoddart, Marian University

Dr. Stoddart received her undergraduate degree from The Ohio State University and went on to get a Master in Education degree: Special Education SLD from The Ohio State University and a Master in Education: Educational Technology from Ohio University. Dr. Stoddart received her Ph.D. from Capella University with a specialty in Teaching and Learning Online. She has taught at Marian University at both the undergraduate and graduate level. Dr. Stoddart has taught Educational Technology courses, Secondary Curriculum and Methods, and Introduction to Exceptional Learners. Before coming to Marian, she taught special education and technology courses at the middle and high school level.

Currently, Dr. Stoddart is the Curriculum and Instruction Department Chair, which includes the Master of Arts in Education: Differentiated Instruction for At-Risk Learners (DIAL) and the Educational Technology programs. She also teaches in the Educational Technology Program and DIAL programs; classes include Innovations in Education, Teaching and Learning Online, Professional Portfolio and Advanced Professional Planning. Dr. Stoddart's research interests include online learning, electronic portfolios, Web 2.0 learning tools, and technology as a tool for 21st century teaching and learning.
